

Mothering Sunday

On 30 March most churches in the UK will celebrate their 'mothers'. £millions will be spent on Mother's Day gifts and cards, and children will give flowers to women in church. It's a joy to honour mothers for their love and caring, but our blessings are lessened when we forget were given a day off the Day's original purpose.

The Mother's Day we know today began on 12 May, 1907, in America, when a woman called Anna Jarvis held a service in her late mother's church to honour her work of organising women's groups to promote friendship and health. The idea spread, and in 1914 Mother's Day was declared an official celebration.

But the European Mothering Sunday goes back to the 16th century,

and was altogether more qualities of God, for faith-based. On the fourth Sunday of Lent people went 'amothering', going to their 'mother' church, the main church in the area, for a special service. In those days domestic servants rarely had free days, but they during Lent, so they could go along with their mothers and families. Times changed, and by the 1900s Mothering Sunday had largely changed into Mother's Day – a celebration of mothers more than mother churches.

Time for a new Church Electoral Roll

2025 is the year when EVERYONE gets dumped off the Electoral Roll and needs to make a definite decision to come back on again.

It happens in the Church of England every six years. Whereas for five years, the Electoral Roll is revised annually by the Electoral Roll Officer, in this sixth year, the roll is dissolved, and we must all re-apply and re-commit ourselves.

That's the quick way of explaining it. If you want a detailed and clear legal break down of how exactly it works, you can find it here. If you manage to wade through all the details of the process, and understand them, it will leave you with admiration for the person who has been brave enough to organise it in your own church!

So, yes, this means you...

A rule for Lent

Fast from criticism, and feast on praise; Fast from self-pity, and feast on joy; Fast from ill temper, and feast on peace; Fast from resentment, and feast on contentment; Fast from jealousy, and feast on contentment; Fast from pride, and feast on love; Fast from selfishness, and feast on service; Fast from fear, and feast on faith.

St Patrick's Day - 17 March

St Patrick's Day parades may be flamboyant and full of Irish razzmatazz but it's all a far cry from the hard life of this humble 5th century Christian who became in time both bishop and apostle of Ireland. Patrick was born the son of a town councillor in the west of England but as a young man he was captured by Irish pirates, shipped to Ireland, and reduced to slavery, made to tend his master's herds.

Desolate and despairing, Patrick turned to prayer. He found God was there for him, even in such desperate circumstances. He spent much time in prayer, and his faith grew and deepened, in contrast to his earlier years, when he "knew not the true God". the north. Then, after six gruelling, lonely years he was told in a dream he would soon go to his own country. He either escaped or was freed, made his way to a port 200 miles away and eventually persuaded some sailors to take him away from Ireland.

After various adventures in other lands, including near-starvation, Patrick landed on English soil at last, and returned to his family. But he was much changed. He had

enjoyed his life of plenty before; now he wanted to devote the rest of his life to Christ. Patrick received some form of training for the priesthood, but not the higher education he really wanted.

By 435, well-educated or not, Patrick was badly needed. Palladius' mission to the Irish had failed, and so the Pope sent Patrick back to the land of his slavery. He set up his see at Armagh and worked principally in the north. He urged the Irish to greater spirituality, set up a school, and made several missionary journeys.

Patrick's writings are the first literature certainly identified from the British Church. They reveal sincere simplicity and a deep pastoral care. He wanted to abolish paganism, idolatry, and was ready for imprisonment or death in the following of Christ.

Patrick remains the most popular of the Irish saints. The Anglican cathedral of Dublin is dedicated to him, as, of course, is the principal cathedral of New York. A small number of Anglican churches in England are dedicated to St Patrick too.

"Looking out of the window"

On 18 February I looked out of the window at 6.45 am and was delighted to see the glow of a red sunrise for the first time in 2025 after weeks of long nights, cold winds and heavy grey skies. Then, to add to the joy, the yellow bulb of our first daffodil of the year was gleaming - ten day later than last year. There is a saying that we should be careful what we wish for. Well, having wished for the first daffodil to arrive, three days later a strong wind blew it down, laying its head on the soil. I have propped it up with a small restraining garden stake and twine!

The snowdrops are in their full magnificence, and have spread, as if by magic, self dividing themselves. Bright yellow and purple crocus are looking very cheerful along with polyanthus plants of various colours, and part of the back lawn is covered in the delicate pale purple crocus, which are presumably all spread by birds. On

close inspection, when I was out in the garden in the sunshine one day with a hoe, tulip shoots, mini daffodils and hyacinths could be seen. Spring really is beginning to show its face. During one of the recent gales many of the extremely tall stalks of the pampas grass gave up the battle to stay upright and had broken and bent over at about sixty degree angles, which made me think of railway signals which click down when advising trains to stop at a junction.

Winter pansies in pots have been struggling in the weather conditions but some are still managing to show cheerful yellow faces. Rose bushes are beginning to show signs of new shoots and one floribunda has a complete new set of leaves already which is very encouraging.

The bird feeders are still very popular with the little birds dashing in and out, and the parakeet gang continue their noisy activities. The one which feeds itself with one "foot" whilst standing on the other is easily recognisable because of some darker feathers on its tail.



The garden is full of colourful growth potential and no doubt will provide more entertainment as we look out of the window as the world wakes up.






